As someone that solely practiced realism in pencil drawings, this mug was my first venture into the abstract -- and one of my first into ceramics. While it still has some realistic aspects, I definitely felt more comfortable with constructing things that don't quite make sense. This mug was slab-built and the handle was pulled. Each sucker on the handle was sculpted individually before being attached. I chose to paint the blue-ringed octopus, which is an animal that I've been fascinated with since the first time I saw it on National Geographic. Octopi, in general, are such intelligent creatures that can virtually shapeshift to blend into their surroundings, and I find that incredibly mesmerizing. In particular, the blue-ringed octopus has a striking pattern that made it extremely fun to paint.

### Waterfall

This is my largest ceramic piece, standing at about 10 inches tall. Continuing my exploration of surrealism, I coil-built this piece. I started knowing that I wanted to layer the coils in a way that branched out of its original shape. When I finished, I felt that the cascading manner of this piece was similar to a waterfall. There is another opening on the reverse side of the piece (not pictured) that completes the waterfall. To begin, this is NOT a middle finger. I have decided that it is a ring finger. The inclusion of this finger plays into the surreal aspect of the piece. Why is it there? We'll never know.

#### Mikaela's Nose

The body of this planter is wheel-thrown. I made the decision to add a nose after the body became warped in the trimming process. The nose itself is based off of that of my dear friend Mikaela, which is why this piece is named "Mikaela's Nose". She has an aquiline nose that I spent several classes trying to replicate. The ears are of my own design and were added after I deemed the piece to be too plain, with holes specifically drilled to put real earrings. Unfortunately, the glaze (chosen by Mikaela) closed up the holes, despite cleaning them out before firing. There is a crack above the nose bridge that appeared after the initial bisque-firing. I had hoped it would be more apparent after glazing, but it was incorporated well nonetheless. Furthermore, I had initially envisioned a more grey-toned glaze, but chose this color upon Mikaela's insistence.

### They're Eyes

This piece is named "They're Eyes" mainly due to the fact that some people likened them to breasts, and I wanted to clear up any misconceptions. It's initial function was a cup, but it now stands as a jewelry dish. The body was thrown on a wheel and the eyes were attached after trimming. Since making Mikaela's Nose, I had an interest in other facial features. The eyemaking process was a new challenge for me. I based their form on how human eyes are constructed on wax figures, specifically those at Madame Tussauds. A lot of it was trial and error; I redid them at least three times before being satisfied with the final product. Some things I would consider trying with a similar piece is adding more eyes around the circumference of the cup and changing their shape to show more variation. One of my favorite aspects of this piece is the inside. I chose to take a risk with the glaze-firing process by placing a bright blue marble inside prior to firing, despite my teacher advising me against it. He was unsure if the marble would pair well with the glaze. However, it turned out just the way I had hoped, and I couldn't be happier with it.

### Cobras

This vase was largely based on antique double-handled vases. The body was thrown on the wheel, and the cobras were attached after trimming. Each cobra was sculpted by hand; adding the details was a painstaking process. The scales on the belly were gently carved out with a needle tool, and maintaining its shape proved to be harder that I thought. The hardest part, however, was when the snakes broke off in an almost bone dry state. After all that work, I was devastated. Fortunately, I was able to fix it (clearly) and it now proudly stands in my room. I had initially used a smokey matte black glaze to create an iron casted appearance, but discarded the idea and used a clear glaze instead as I felt that the subtle details would be more noticeable. My signature (bottom of handle) shows my initials in a yin-yang symbol.


#### She but the H is silent


Year: 2020

#### Nov. 29th, 2020


